NORTHCOTE AQUATIC AND RECREATION CENTRE REDEVELOPMENT

Northcote Aquatic and Recreation Centre is raising the roof on expectations, with unique design features to support community health and wellbeing.

Architect Brett Diprose, Associate Principal Warren and Mahoney is proud of the development of this unique facility.

“It will be the best of its kind in Victoria. It will revolutionise the aquatics industry and people’s expectations of an aquatic centre,” he says.

“The timber ceiling of the Northcote Aquatic and Recreation Centre is really the jewel in the crown of the facility. It’s what will set it apart from any other facility. The timber creates a unique aesthetic that really accentuates that health and wellbeing aspect of the project.”

Shaped by community consultation and completed by Warren and Mahoney Australia, the all-electric design targets a 6 Star Green Star rating which is the highest rating possible in the Green Building Council of Australia’s sustainability rating system.

DAREBIN AND ABORIGINAL HOUSING VICTORIA TAKE THE LEAD

Darebin City Council has taken the lead across Victoria in signing a groundbreaking Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Aboriginal Housing Victoria (AHV).

The MoU, under development for more than 18 months and signed in November 2022, commits to exploring rates concessions on all AHV-managed properties in Darebin. It also commits Council to exploring the availability of housing stock, and to working in partnership with AHV to increase the wellbeing, community participation and inclusion in Council's services for people living in AHV-managed homes.

The Federal Government's *Closing the Gap Report* identifies housing as one of the key socioeconomic outcomes important to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people's rights, wellbeing and quality of life.

Federal Minister for Indigenous Australians Linda Burney has commented previously on the role all levels of government must play.

"The Closing the Gap architecture can only work when all parties are invested and there is a coordinated effort from all jurisdictions in partnership with First Nations Peoples," Minister Burney says.

With more than 1,500 rental properties across Victoria, AHV is the largest Aboriginal Registered Housing Agency in the country.

In signing the MoU, AHV Chief Executive Officer Darren Smith reinforced the call for action and partnership with Aboriginal communities at all levels of government.

"This agreement makes a significant step forward in establishing greater outcomes for Aboriginal Victorians at a local level," Mr Smith said.

"It sets a precedent which other councils across Victoria should aspire to. Darebin City Council has shown real leadership to other councils in its relationship with the local Aboriginal community."

In the leadup to the MoU signing, in June 2022 Council voted unanimously to introduce rate concessions on all AHV properties, relating to the provision of affordable housing.

This will play a significant part in supporting one of AHV's key strategic targets of reducing Victorian Aboriginal homelessness by 10 per cent each year, over a 10-year period.

In summing up Council's commitment within the MoU, Cr Lina Messina, Mayor at the time of the MoU signing, put the call out to other councils.

"In creating this MoU we listened to, and took the lead from the Darebin Aboriginal Advisory Committee," Cr Messina said.

"We hope that other Councils will follow suit in order to improve access to housing for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people living right across the state."

HÃY ĐÓNG GÓP Ý KIẾN CHO NGÂN SÁCH THƯỜNG NIÊN 2023/24

Ý kiến cộng đồng đóng góp là phần quan trọng khi chúng tôi lập kế hoạch ngân sách hàng năm.

Để giúp soạn thảo Ngân sách Thường niên 2023/24 nhằm đáp ứng nhu cầu đa dạng của cộng đồng, chúng tôi muốn hiểu những dịch vụ và dự án nào là quan trọng đối với quý vị.

Ngân sách thường niên là phần quan trọng trong việc lập kế hoạch cho tương

lai Darebin. Sử dụng Kế hoạch Hội đồng Thành phố 2021-25 làm kim chỉ nam, ngân sách này đề ra ngân khoản tài trợ cho các ưu tiên của Hội đồng Thành phố nhằm giúp xây dựng một cộng đồng thịnh vượng, an toàn và bình đẳng.

Khi cộng đồng chúng ta tiếp tục phát triển và thay đổi, chúng tôi biết Darebin cũng phải đương đầu với áp lực đáng kể về ngân khoản tài trợ khi mà thuế địa phương có mức giới hạn tối đa. Tất cả những điều này khiến cho việc chúng tôi lập kế hoạch chi tiêu trong tương lai cho các dịch vụ và chương trình dành cho cộng đồng trở nên rất quan trọng.

Một khi đã soạn thảo xong, chúng tôi cũng sẽ trình dự thảo ngân sách trở lại với cộng đồng vào cuối tháng 5 để quý vị xem xét và đóng góp ý kiến phản hồi.

PAVING THE WAY

Leisure and sporting facilities, roads and bridges, footpaths and cycleways, parks and open spaces.

These are just some of the vital community assets we are renewing and upgrading through this year's Capital Works Program.

Some of our recently completed projects include:

Kerb and channel renewal

This month we will complete delivery of about 700 metres of kerb and channel and associated paving through a \$400,000 project to improve drainage and prevent flooding hotspots right across Darebin.

Revitalising Reservoir


Since 2020 we've worked together as part of the Reservoir Suburban Revitalisation Board to commit about \$3.5 million in Victorian Government funding to 25 different projects in Reservoir's main activity centre.

The recently completed 'Bike it Rezza' project included installing rubber kerbing, bollards and line marking along Edwardes Street and Broadway, making it safer for cyclists and improving sustainable travel options for local shoppers.

We also recently completed footpath improvement works along Spring Street and High Street, including wayfinding signs, new flag poles and construction of a new seating space with custom street furniture, bike hoops and landscaping at the corner of High Street and Broadway.

TAKING IT TO THE STREETS


Your Street Your Say is your chance to help improve our local streets and neighbourhood for everyone who lives, works, studies or travels through Darebin.



Lemon and Basil Sorbet

Ingredients


- 6 - 7 large clean, dry, organic lemons (to yield 300ml juice)
- 250g sugar
- 50g glucose
- 500ml water
- 1/2 cup fresh basil leaves (tightly packed), stems removed

Method

1. Peel 3 lemons, avoiding the white pith. Add to a small saucepan with sugar, glucose and water. Bring to a rolling boil for 4-5 minutes. Remove from heat, add lemon juice and half the basil leaves roughly torn. Chill.
2. Sieve syrup into a jug. Roll remaining basil leaves into a tight cigar-shape and slice into fine ribbons. Run the knife through the basil once more, cutting it into small pieces and add to chilled syrup.
3. Pour the mixture into a stainless steel bowl and freeze for 3 hours, stirring every hour. Or, churn in a domestic ice-cream machine until firm sorbet consistency.
4. Serve from the freezer. If the unchurned mixture has frozen solid, blitz in a blender until smooth.

Reservoir lemons are abundant during citrus season. This special flavour is Daniel's herbal twist on a classic and can be made with or without an ice-cream churner.

BEATING THE HEAT

Does your home heat up quickly in summer? This could be due to heat entering the roof as a result of improper insulation, uncontrolled air leaks from gaps under doors that cause cool air to escape, or unshaded windows.

Managing these issues with a well-designed and insulated home can significantly lower your home's temperature, reducing your air conditioner use and energy bills. Draught-proofing windows or sealing up gaps and cracks will also minimise heat entering your home.

The size and location of your windows affect the amount of sunlight entering your home.

Simple tips to help minimise this include using thick blackout blinds with a pelmet and placing awnings, shutters or plants outside your windows.
