5. PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

MINUTE NO. 314

The Chairperson Cr. Fontana, responded to the following questions submitted for Public Question Time:

Anne Laver submitted the following question:

"To the Mayor and the Council

I refer to the Audit Committee Report dated 6th June 16. Item 6.1 Matters arising from the previous minutes. Item 28 Internal Audit Report and page 24 for the Internal Audit Report.

My Question is when will the Council review this polity of self-authorisation of expenses? The policy is contrary to S3C of the Act to ensure transparency and accountability in Council decision making."

The Chairperson, Cr. Fontana provided the following response:

"Section 3C of the Local Government Act (the Act) sets out the objectives of Council when facilitating Council business. As highlighted by Ms Laver one of the objectives is to ensure transparency and accountability in Council decision-making.

Section 75 of the Local Government Act requires Council's to adopt and maintain a policy in relation to the reimbursement of expenses for Councillors and Committee members.

Council has appropriately adopted the Councillor Support and Expenses Policy 2013 (the Policy), as required under Section 75B of the Local Government Act adhering to its responsibility to ensure transparency and accountability in relation to expenses and reimbursements. The Policy provides that Councillors submit a signed declaration electronically or in hard copy for mobile phone and cab charges to the Corporate Governance and Performance Department within 14 days of the account being sent. With a further 14 days provided after submitting the declaration to make payment to the Council for any non-council related expenses incurred. The onus is on each individual councillor to make a true declaration before submitting it to the Governance Department for endorsement.

To ensure enhanced transparency in relation to expenses and reimbursements incurred by individual councillors, the information is published quarterly on Council's website within one week of reporting the information to Council's Audit Committee."

Anne Laver submitted the following question:

"I refer to the Audit Report dated 6th June 16 and Councillor Expenses and Support Policy. Item 12.1 Councillor Support and Expenses, S75b of the Act.

As at that date certain councillors had outstanding monies owing to the Council. When will this money be repaid?"

The Chairperson provided the following response:

"Officers have advised that there are currently no outstanding monies owed to Council by any councillor."

Serena O'Meley of Reservoir submitted the following questions:

- 1. (a) Can you please confirm that only the former Ruthven Primary School site will be valued on a GRZ2 zoning and that the 1.8ha of land adjoining the Merri Creek at the former Lakeside Secondary College will be valued on an Industrial zoning?
 - (b) Why has the Education Department had to proceed independently with the valuation of these two parcels of land without instructions from Council?
- 2. Will you please note for the public record my acknowledgment of your offer of a meeting with the Mayor and CEO to discuss the Ruthven and Lakeside sites, and that my reason for declining is because I am concerned about perceptions regarding such a meeting when the State Ombudsman is investigating my complaint which relates to the two sites?

The Chairperson, Cr. Fontana provided the following responses:

- 1. (a) Representatives from the Department of Education and Training and the Department of Environment Land Water and Planning have advised Council that the Victorian Government seeks to obtain valuations on the basis outlined in your question.
 - (b) The answer to your question would be more appropriately answered by the Department of Education and Training, not Council.
- 2. Thank you Serena, your concerns have been publicly acknowledged.

Peter Thomson of Reservoir submitted the following question:

"Will you the city of Darebin boycott the consumption of any CUB products?"

The Chairperson advised that the question would not be responded pursuant to section 54(6) of the *Darebin Governance Local Law* as it relates to a matter outside the duties functions and powers of Council.

• Manny Spiteri from the Preston Market Traders submitted the following question:

"How and when as a result of this major amendment has the Council met with and consulted with traders as specified by this document (Darebin Planning Scheme C135) as by my research and questioning the Council has not met with the traders to implement the recommendations and actions specified under the amendment."

The Chairperson, Cr. Fontana advised that more information was required in relation to this matter and that a response would be provided in writing to Mr Spiteri.

David Lester of Reservoir submitted the following questions:

- 1. What measures do Council plan to ensure residents affected by the proposed closure of Cheddar Rd and Carol St to have ready access to their home while also allowing emergency services and access regress through, both north and south of Carrol St?
- 2. What measures will Council undertake to ensure procedural fairness and transparency planning decisions are made.

• Dulcie Hook of Reservoir submitted the following question:

"My concern is regarding Council's proposed permanent closure of the central median strip on Cheddar Road at Carrol Street, Reservoir. I live in Carrol Street.

The letter dated 12 July 2016 – with queries or comments by 25 July 2016, was not received until 4 August 2016 with the 'Preston Leader'. Some folks have not seen it.

Why have you planned this action? I ask you Councillor's, and the Engineers, what points you considered before coming to your decision? Did you visit the site?

- I don't believe this intersection is a 'black spot' area. There is uninterrupted visibility to the left and to the right.
- Carrol Street is not busy at the late afternoon peak time there is more traffic with vehicles diverting from Broadway along Carrol Street to avoid the top of Broadway congestion. Vehicles coming from Reservoir Station direction into Carrol Street would also be affected if the strip is closed.

More traffic will need to wind through residential streets; those going further north will use the Crookston Road median strip. Do you plan to close that also? Then to close the two strips further north?

The letter also blatantly falsely states the Reservoir level crossing is to be grade separated by 2018. The State Government announced that work to start in 2018 – finish 2022 (i.e. if they really do as promised).

My request is that you meet with concerned people at the Cheddar Road, Carrol Street intersections and you also have community consultation.

We look forward to hearing from you in writing please."

Steve Hamilton, Acting Chief Executive Officer provided a combined response to Mr Lester and Ms Hook and advised that the proposed closure for the roads in question is no longer proceeding. Officers will consult with the effected residents in the normal course of operations. A written response will also be provided.

Amy Stubberfield of Reservoir submitted the following question:

Does the Council currently have any plans, or future plans to address the gender pay gap amongst workers?

The Chairperson, Cr. Fontana advised that the question related to an operational matter and would be taken on notice.

• Keith Coffey of Reservoir submitted the following question:

- 1. Is there anyone who inspects the quality and workmanship of footpath replacement once completed? E.g. 93 Darebin Blvd, Reservoir. The footpath is uneven and tripping hazard.
- 2. Is it possible to have lights installed along the walking path at Bundoora Park?

The Chairperson, Cr. Fontana provided the following responses:

- 1. Inspections do occur after works but a further inspection will occur and a response provided.
- 2. The question will be taken on notice and a written response provided.

Nahin of Preston submitted the following question:

- 1. What is the Council doing to maintain the culture at Preston Market?
- 2. What is the Council doing all the parking loss due to the redevelopment of the Preston Market seeing the Council is taking over the responsibility of the market parking?

The Chairperson, Cr. Fontana provided the following responses:

1. In relation to Preston Market, officers will liaise with owners of the market to ensure everyone is happy and working for the right reasons.

In relation to parking on site, there has not been any redevelopment commence. A
recent presentation was made to Council by the owners of the market regarding
proposed changes. Parking issues will be addressed once a planning application is
received by Council. Council has recently commenced monitoring the parking at the
market.

Mahsa Hajjari of Heidelberg Heights submitted the following question:

"Has any consultation occurred with the community regarding developments at the Preston Market?"

The Chairperson, Cr. Fontana provided the following responses:

"Once a full set of plans have been received regarding the developments, they will be assessed to determine how the plans comply with the Council's suggestions for the market. There have been concerns from Councillors as have been raised in the past regarding the future of the market and what will be further offered in relation to community benefits."

Response to Public Question taken on notice at the Council meeting on 1 August 2016

At the Council meeting held on 1 August 2016, the following question submitted from Peter Thomson of Reservoir was taken on notice by the Chairperson.

"To provide the old library in Ralph Street, Reservoir for the use as an office/cultural space for the Wurundjeri".

In accordance section 54(12) of the Darebin Governance Local Law, the following written response has now been provided to Mr Thomson from the Acting Director Assets and Business Services:

"I refer to Council's meeting of 1 August 2016, during which you raised a question during public question time, asking that Council provide the former Reservoir Library in Ralph Street, Reservoir for use as office/cultural space for the Wurundjeri Tribe Land Compensation and Cultural Heritage Council.

Thank you for your interest in locating within the Darebin City Council.

The former Reservoir Library in Ralph Street, Reservoir is currently surplus to Council requirements. The building itself is not presently fit for habitation as it requires re-roofing, flooring, essential safety measures and removal of internal hazardous materials (asbestos). Additionally, the former library building sits in the middle of a large parcel of land owned by Council which has significant potential for development in line with the Reservoir Structure Plan which has been approved by Council.

Officers previously presented a report to Council at its meeting of 16 May 2016 seeking Council approval to undertake a detailed assessment of options to redevelop the site. Consideration of the matter was deferred and it has rescheduled to the meeting of 5 September 2016.

Darebin has several facilities in the Reservoir/Bundoora area with spare capacity for hosting community groups. Should you or your organisation require access to community facilities or community space within the City of Darebin, please contact me with some specific details of the nature of the space you require (e.g. area in m², hours of use, access requirements, what it would be required for, community benefits and how the services align with Council's strategic goals) and we will see what is available. Alternatively, we may be able to assist you to locate commercial office space in the Darebin area."

Following the development of the training package, 19 training sessions over the past 18 months have been delivered through local Councils and education providers, realising approximately one Say NO to Racism training session has been delivered every 4 weeks in the Victorian community since 2015.

Further work is now underway to respond to the reach of the program specifically with sporting clubs and state government agencies and departments. Council has begun working with Polykala on developing a Communication and Marketing plan to support efforts to increase the uptake of the program.

Council has written to Mr Robin Scott, Minister of Multicultural Affairs to encourage use of the training package across the Victorian Public Sector.

DAREBIN - A VICTORIAN STATE GOVERNMENT

Report Background

To provide information to Council on the delivery of a \$9.6 million Victorian State Government program to build 64 compliant, competition ready outdoor netball courts in inner Melbourne.

Previous Council Resolution

Summary

The Victorian State Government committed \$9.6 million in their pre-election commitments to the delivery of 64 compliant, competition ready outdoor netball courts across the municipalities of Melbourne, Moreland, Yarra and Darebin. It should be noted that this funding is specifically for the delivery of outdoor netball courts.

In conjunction with Sport and Recreation Victoria (SRV), Council officers are part of the Inner City Netball Steering Committee that has been working to deliver the election commitment and increase the provision of netball courts in Darebin. It is likely that Darebin can accommodate up to 23 compliant netball courts under this funding commitment, which equates to approximately \$3,450,000 in grant funding being received by Council across the financial years of 2016/2017, 2017/2018 and beyond. This grant funding is a once-off opportunity.

This report details the proposed locations for additional sports courts, subject to community consultation. Site investigation, detailed design and construction of the identified courts will commence from 1 July 2016.

The delivery of courts in Darebin has already occurred under this funding, with the full reconstruction of three outdoor courts at Darebin Community Sports Centre in 2015/2016.

Report Background

Summary

This report provides the history and background relating to the right-of-way/road adjoining 33-37 Cooper Street and 34-38 Asling Street, Preston as shown in **Appendix A** as well as the outcome of the statutory procedures into its proposed discontinuance.

In 1997, Council resolved to discontinue and sell part of the right-of-way/road bound by Cooper, Fettling, Asling and Spring Streets in Preston. The part of the right-of-way/road adjoining 33-37 Cooper Street and 34-38 Asling Street, Preston (Road) was not included in the discontinuance at that time.

In 2015, Council received an enquiry from an adjoining property owner for the potential discontinuance and purchase of the Road. Initial investigations identified that the Road is occupied and although it is not listed in Council's Register of Public Roads it is a road on title.

All adjoining property owners were notified of the proposal. The owner of 33 Cooper Street has confirmed their interest in acquiring land from the Road at the rear of their property, if it were to be discontinued.

No objections have been received from adjoining property owners, service authorities or other Council departments in relation to the proposal.

At its Ordinary Meeting on 18 April 2016, Council resolved to commence the statutory procedures and give public notice of the proposed discontinuance of the Road.

Public notice of the proposal was given in Preston Leader and Northcote Leader newspapers on Tuesday, 24 May 2016. Notification was also given on Council's website. The notice period ended on Friday 24 June 2016 with no submissions received.

This report provides the outcome of the statutory procedures for the proposed discontinuance and sale of the section of Road rear 33 to 37 Cooper Street and 34 to 38 Asling Street, Preston, and, now upon their completion, recommends that the Road be discontinued and sold by private treaty in accordance with Council policy and transfer any land not sold to itself.
