5. QUESTION AND SUBMISSION TIME

The Chairperson, Cr Rennie, responded to the following questions submitted for Public Question Time.

Serena O'Meley, Reservoir

At the Darebin Council meeting of 5 October 2018, Council resolved (MINUTE NO. 18-289) to oppose rezoning of Public Parkland at 1-11 McMahon Road and to negotiate for its retention within the municipality. This land is of strategic importance for biodiversity, habitat and recreation purposes because it is located in Clements Reserve which borders Darebin Creek. Can Council confirm whether this land has been secured from DEWLP? If not, can a progress report be provided on the current state of negotiations to retain the land?

Response from Chairperson, Mayor Rennie

Thank you for your question.

I can confirm that Council wrote to the Minister for Planning following the resolution of 15 October 2018. In this letter, Council stated that it doesn't support the proposal to rezone the Land from Public Park and Recreation Zone and that we're calling for the Land to be either surrendered to the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning, or transferred to Council.

Discussions between Council and the State Government about the future of the land are ongoing; however, we understand that the State Government is not proposing to rezone it while the discussions are underway.

One of the avenues being explored by Council is the possible purchase of the land. A report to Council with a recommendation about the future of the land is expected to be presented in the first quarter of next year.

• Robin Vote, Preston

I'm the convener of Does Council Care and I'm here tonight to make a submission to item 8.3 which is the Gardening and Lawn Mowing service but I do have a question as well.

How is the Case Management Pilot Project going? And when can we expect some action?

Response from Manager Aged & Disability, Shadi Hanna

Through you Mayor, Council Officers have been preparing and planning for the implementation of Homecare packages trials. We have engaged with a not-for-profit provider to explore how Council can offer its existing aged care services to clients who wish to continue to be part of Council services once they move to Homecare packages.

The trial is expected to engage about 40 existing clients. We are in the process of finalising our internal planning and hopefully we will be meeting with the not-for-profit to continue this conversation in the next couple of weeks.

Response from Chairperson, Mayor Rennie

Thank you Mr Hanna. Thank you Ms Vote for that question, we will come back to you for the submission at 8.3.

Nish Dahnayake, Greenborough

It's a question on DECC and funding. I represent a group called People for Human Rights and Equality in the Singhalese and Tamil Committee.

My questions are relating to the fact that you have seriously demotivated the DECC team by taking the funds off them and now offering financial planning.

Are you aware of the capabilities of individuals engaged in DECC activities? As an example the guy who handles the bookkeeping Sian, has worked with the World Bank as an economist and myself have also done million dollar projects in Australia and overseas. It's that kind of people that are engaged in voluntary work.

My second question is; Can you view these endeavours rather with some loving kindness which is a philosophy as volunteers we follow. May I quote a verse from the Buddha that I have repeatedly read at DECC memorial services for the victims of Genocide. The verse means just as a Mother would guard her only child at the risk of her own life. Let him cultivate boundless mind of loving kindness towards all beings. Let thoughts of boundless love pervade the whole world above, below and across without any obstruction, without any hatred without any animosity.

Response from Chairperson, Mayor Rennie

Thank you for the question. I would like to say that as someone that regularly attends the committee of DECC, I appreciate that there are many skilled and talented people with a range of skills and that nothing in relation to the situation which DECC finds itself with funding is a reflection on the very fine quality skills and professional abilities of members of the community. Thank you.

John Nugent , Epping

Mayor Rennie, I have two questions tonight. The first question was that I backed La Trobe yesterday in the Melbourne Cup as I was hoping it would come first for a change but anyway not to worry.

Mayor Rennie my question is about "The Gag" that council has placed on me asking questions on the Dole/Donath Masterplan by phone.

Firstly I believe my democratic rights have been taken away from me by this action taken by this Council.

There was a petition presented to Council with 130 signatures requesting that I be their advocate to speak to Council on the masterplan and as yet I have not received a reply regarding this petition. I know I have more people supporting me than on the CRG.

In the letter given to me, it does not state a time limit. Has the Council got the right to take away one's democratic rights away from me? Mayor Rennie, have I got a right of appeal against this decision? By the time this question is answered it will be 6 months since I have rung up and by the time you recommence in 2020 it will be 8 months.

Mayor Rennie, My second question concerns Mr Brian Sanaghan. Could you please advise why the police were called by the Council on the 2/9/19, when Mr Shanaghan did not enter the building?

Also has Mr Sanaghan got the right to stand outside the Council Building when there is a Council Meeting? And isn't this a waste of Police resources every time he turns up?

Response from Chairperson, Mayor Rennie

Thank you Mr Nugent. In relation to your question on Brian Sanaghan. I'll take that on notice.

In relation to your question about why you are no longer able to call Officers at Customer Service and other people; that has been explained to you and relates to the inordinate amount of time that people were spending trying to provide you multiple answers on the same question asked over again. That amount of time is unjustified for a person who lives in Epping to expect to be able to tie up Officers and their time distracting them from work that they are doing for people and behalf of people in this municipality, thank you.

Nalliah, Suriyakamaran

I'm from the Darebin Ethnic Communities Council. I just want to know whether the Councillors are mindful of the fact that migrants' lived experience, especially in Australia and other Western countries, is one where they are marginalised, they are made invisible, their skillset and their qualifications and all the learning they have are not valued. That's unfortunately the reality, so when migrants look at offers they would view it through that lens. So my question is were the Councillors mindful of the fact that migrant communities' experience in this country especially in relation to acknowledging their skills and their contributions has always been one of them being invisible and were Councillors mindful of that? Thank you.

Response from Chairperson, Mayor Rennie

Thank you for that question. This Council is particularly committed to working with communities from all over the world and this Council is particularly conscience that one of our greatest strengths is the diversity of our community and the many wonderful skills and experiences that they bring to Australia and to our community in Darebin. That's on display in many of the policies that we have in place, in many of the activities that Council undertakes, and one of the reasons why we were one of the inaugural councils to sign up to the Welcoming Cities Framework, which is a framework that embraces the skills and experience and strength of people from all over the world when they come to our municipality.

Adam Newman, Wollert

My question relates to item 8.7 on the Agenda regarding the Electoral Commissions report on the boundaries of Darebin City Council and I'm not entirely sure if it is appropriate for this section, but I will ask the question anyway.

Does the Council support the recommendation made by the Electoral Commission in regards to the Ward boundaries?

Response from Chairperson, Mayor Rennie

Thank you very much for that question. That matter is on the Agenda for consideration tonight, so I am not able to pre-empt the decision of Council, but we will get to that item and I would hope that if you would like to make a submission you can stay until we get to that item on the Agenda. You are able to make a submission of up to two minutes in length that talks to what you think we should do and helps inform our decision. We invite the submissions before the item in question. Thank you.

Sofia Kotanidis, Bundoora

Hello, considering all the work and cooperation DECC has had with both Councillors and Council Officers for over 20 years and very many times Council has sought consultation from DECC on numerous issues relating to the ethnic community. Why has the Council then passed a motion for DECC to have governance and financial planning training?

We've done so much work with Council over so many years and we were always consulted. To now be given this, we find this very deeply offensive and very degrading.

Will Council apologise to DECC for this statement? And then would they seek to mend relations with DECC for the betterment of not only the Ethnic Communities but also the whole of the Darebin Community.

Response from Chairperson, Mayor Rennie

Thank you for that question. The second part of your question relates to an item on the Agenda, so I am unable to pre-empt a decision of this Council. The first part of your question in relation to why Council would offer governance support relates to previous work that Council has done with the Darebin Ethnic Communities Council, which identified some governance issues which resulted in DECC asking and receiving support from Council in the form of a consultant to deliver some training. That took place earlier in the year and the consultant and DECC identified in the

submission that they would do further work on governance and as a result of that, Council with goodwill extended an offer to support DECC with that further work.

Pursuant to the Councils *Governance Local Law 2017*, the response to a question from the public taken on notice must be recorded in the minutes of the next Ordinary Council meeting.

At the Council meeting held on 14 October 2019, the following questions were taken on notice by the Chairperson, Mayor Rennie

• Keith Coffey, Reservoir

My complaint, I'll call it a complaint is the lack of service. Why do Council put recycle bins near shops and don't empty them regularly? That one's been there for nearly two months and why do they put in garden beds to make the area beautiful and have it full of weeds and not go back and care for it?

And another thing, this is a separate one, except for the recycle bin, I reported that, and I reported that on your downstairs thing on the weekend and today, and I came home tonight and they are still just the same. I firstly reported the recycle bin last week and the lady didn't give me a number because her computer wasn't working. I took that at face value and I thought

It would get emptied but it's just appalling to think that we are going back to being like we are the forgotten ward again.

Response from Brett Grambau, Manager City Works (Actioned on 15 Oct 2019)

Officers confirmed the location of the unemptied recycled bins and rubbish bins and organised for these to be attended to the next day.

John Nugent, Epping

Once again the shopkeepers at the Preston Market were disadvantaged by the people using the Market as a car park. Thus the customers wishing to purchase goods from the Market could not do so.

This is brought about by the Council leasing the City Oval to the NFNL and not taking into account the shopkeepers at the Market.

Mayor Rennie, I have talked to several butchers, fishmongers, poultry shop, a deli shop and other food stalls. All shopkeepers advised that their takings were down by 15% to 20%.

Mayor Rennie, will Council compensate the shopkeepers at the Market?

Mayor Rennie, will Council give the shopkeepers a fair go and finally get a resolution to this problem?

• John Nugent, Epping

Mayor Rennie,

With regards to the letter I received from Council dated 26/7/19. It stated that the NFNL have arranged for the use of extra car parking with Melbourne Polytechnic. In your letter it also stated that NFNL will use social media platform to heavy promote and encourage using public transport and the parking option advantage. It also stated the NFNL have confirmed that clubs attending the City Oval, hire mini buses to transport players and supporters to and from the venue. It finally states Council officers are liaising with the NFNL regarding these arrangements for the upcoming finals series.

Mayor Rennie, I have notice from the NFNL sent out to the clubs, it states – patrons attending the finals at the City Oval are encouraged to park at the Melbourne Polytechnic – nothing about not parking in the Market. In the same notice to clubs it states once again nothing about using public transport and clubs hiring mini buses to transport players and supporters.

Mayor Rennie, if this Council 'Fair Dinkum' to all parties then it's about time Council lease out the City Oval for 1 (one) match only on weekends (Saturday and Sunday) starting at 2.30pm.

Mayor Rennie, in the letter (26/7/19) it stated Council offices are liaising with the NFNL regarding these arrangements.

Mayor Rennie, why didn't Council officers liaise with the NFNL from week one of the finals informing these arrangements were not kept or didn't offices know about any of these arrangements.

A written response dated 24 October 2019 was provided to John Nugent by Rachel Ollivier, General Manager City Sustainability and Strategy.

Thank you for your questions submitted for Public Question Time at the 14 October 2019 Council Meeting.

"Mayor Rennie, will Council compensate the shopkeepers at the Market?"

Thank you for your care for shopkeepers at the market. Ensuring the market and traders thrive is a really important priority for Council.

Generally events that draw people to the local area increase foot traffic and help to promote local businesses such as the Preston Market. Running events in activity centres like central Preston is a well-established approach to local business development.

While we have no plans to compensate shopkeepers at the Market, what we can do is support local traders in lots of different ways and our Economic Development team can speak to local businesses to work out what options there are to help in their circumstances.

What you can do is either pass contact details for any businesses you are aware of to Council, or encourage people that have raised concerns with you to contact Council directly. Council staff would speak to them directly.

Mayor Rennie, will Council give the shopkeepers a fair go and finally get a resolution to this problem?"

Please refer to our letters to you of 8 October 2018 and 26 July 2019, regarding how we're helping provide parking for both Market and Oval users. We regard the strategies in place as suitable for best sharing parking space in the area during times when lots of people want to use it including the peak use times at the Preston City Oval. We will continue to work the NFLN to identify further opportunities for improvement.

Mayor Rennie, - why didn't Council officers liaise with the NFNL from week one of the finals informing these arrangements were not kept or didn't officers know about any of these arrangements.

I can confirm that Council officers are in regular communication with the NFNL and have a good working relationship with them to manage these events. We will continue to work the NFLN to identify further opportunities for improvement. I am conscious that you may not have full access to all communications made by the NFNL to their stakeholders in the lead up to the finals.

The Preston Market carpark is privately owned and managed by Preston Market Management, which means that Council does not set parking restrictions or paid parking arrangements at the site. One thing that any market operators concerned about parking can do is to raise this with the market management. Further detail about parking is in our letters to you of 8 October 2018 and 26 July 2019.

• Hahn Huynh-Pitts, Preston

With the Preston Market, can Council check or raise question to the owner around the safety of the market?

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Penders Park Master Plan 2019 (Appendix C) sets out a long-term community vision with design principles and priority initiatives for this much-loved park in Thornbury.

The master plan has been developed in close collaboration with the Penders Park Project Control Group (PCG), a local community reference group established by Council to help it develop the master plan. The PCG has been instrumental in fostering a high level of community engagement in the master planning process, including valuable input from the Wurundjeri Woi Wurrung Cultural Heritage Aboriginal Corporation.

This has resulted in a meaningful place-specific vision that will guide the direction of the park in the future. The vision is that "Penders Park is a significant gathering place for our diverse and changing community. As a district park, it's a place for play, celebrating, active and passive recreation and connecting with nature".

On 29 July 2019, Council resolved to endorse the release of the draft Penders Park Master Plan for consultation with the community. This final round of consultation concluded on the 26 August. The majority of the 21 submissions (**Appendix D**) showed broad support for the draft master plan and validated key elements such as toilet upgrades, play space improvements, central shelter upgrade, walking paths, exercise equipment and planting that responds to heritage and natural park context.

The following items are proposed to be included in the master plan as a result of the consultation:

- Prioritising initiatives for the park (including council-led and community-led activities)
- Clarifying support for plant species and habitats to support local fauna, insects and birdlife

The Penders Park Master Plan 2019 reflects these minor amendments.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A draft concept design for the Northern Reservoir 'Streets for People' Corridor (Northern Corridor) has been developed and was released for public consultation between 3 September and 22 September 2019.

The draft concept designs that were consulted on proposed corridor interventions to reduce vehicle speeds and better manage traffic volume; make it easier to walk, wheel and ride; and make streets greener. It aimed to meet the Streets for People Project's vision "to provide a safe, inviting walking and cycling environment for residents to access their local parks, schools and shops."

Using a significant level of input from the community and key stakeholders, including three stages of consultation, the concept designs have now been finalised.

The final concept designs propose interventions that would be constructed over time. Opportunities for external funding will be explored with funding for further design stages and construction of most of the proposals being referred to consideration in future years budgets to be considered along with priorities across the City.

Funding has been allocated for construction of five street improvements along the Northern Corridor in 2019-20. If council endorses the concept designs proposed, construction is expected to start in early 2020.

8.3 GARDENING AND LAWN MOWING TRIAL (AGE FRIENDLY

DAREBIN)

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

When Council considered the Age Friendly Darebin review in July 2019, it resolved that options for a lawn mowing and gardening service should be considered at a meeting later in the year. Council allocated \$120,000 for the trial implementation of a lawn mowing and/or gardening service or volunteer program during 2019/20.

This report presents three options for council to consider:

- (1) Trial of a contracted gardening/lawnmowing service provided only to eligible older people with high needs in defined circumstances (not recommended)
- (2) Trial of a contracted gardening/lawnmowing service to any older residents eligible for Commonwealth Home Support Program, with waiting list (not recommended)
- (3) Community-led action research project to engage three community-based partners who will test various gardening and lawn mowing service models (recommended).

These options are all presented as a trial. After the trial project is concluded Council can make a further decision about whether or how the program or services should be continued.

8.4 ASSISTANCE FOR RESERVOIR TRADERS

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The level crossing removal at Reservoir is a once in a generation investment in Reservoir that will make the station and its connection with the Reservoir shopping centre safer and a more attractive place for visitors, as well as improving the walking connection between Broadway and Edwardes Street. When completed it is expected to strengthen the local economy and continue to attract the largest commuter numbers of any railway station in Darebin. It is also a large construction project which is currently creating disruption to local roads and access while it is being built.

Council has long advocated to the state government, which is responsible for the Level Crossing Removal Project, for:

- High standards of design that improves Reservoir
- Construction management that minimises disruption to roads, access and parking,
- Effective support for local traders and marketing of the centre so that customers shop local and support these businesses during disruption and afterwards.

Council has also set up its own dedicated team and promotional program to support traders during this time. Council's program has included practical help, communication and engagement campaigns to encourage customers to shop local and visit the area. Practical things that Council has been doing include making sure car parks are kept free for customers, and streets are clean and inviting.

The State Government started major construction works in January 2019 and since 19 August, parts of the junction intersection have been closed, which means that east west travel by vehicles isn't currently possible. The junction intersection is expected to open again by 20 December 2019.

To help traders during this time in particular, a substantial program of promotional and business support activities is scheduled through to the 2019 Christmas period and the details of this are outlined in this report. This program includes campaigns to encourage customers into the area including Council's #loveRessa campaign and the Pledge to Shop Local campaign.

This report recommends that Council offers further support to all businesses in the Reservoir centre including:

- Running a special street trading event one day for each of the four weeks until Christmas, that would give businesses in Edwardes St and Broadway business precincts the opportunity trade on the footpath.
- Offering free participation in Council's LED Light\$mart program which saves businesses on power bills.
- On-site business mentoring recognising that many businesses struggle to leave their business to attend sessions, mentoring will be made available on site at the business.
- Running a further mail out to local residents encouraging them to support local businesses and promoting events and activities in the Centre as part of the #LoveRezza campaign.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Darebin City Council is committed to building a fair, inclusive and equitable city. The diversity of our community is our greatest asset for building a greener, bolder, more connected city, which is why the views and insights of residents, business owners and the community sector are integral to Council's decision-making.

This report brings together a project to ensure community engagement is conducted in a way that includes all voices in the community, and is open and transparent. This approach is to ensure the community can trust the decisions made on behalf of the city.

International research shows that the decision-making of governments is improved when communities are involved (Parvin 2018). It makes local government respond better to the diverse needs of the community; design better services; and best of all, use the ideas of our community to respond to change. It also builds trust in government as people become involved in, and therefore see themselves reflected in, their local community.

DECLARATION - NON-RESIDENTIAL BATCH 1

PURPOSE

To consider the declaration of a Special Charge in relation to the Solar Saver program.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Solar Saver program is a key action of the Council Plan and Council's *Climate Emergency Plan*. This report relates to the non-residential stream.

The report considers the declaration of a non-residential Special Charge Scheme which is a pilot batch of the non-residential stream of the Solar Saver program. The pilot includes five installations, adding 118kW of solar capacity to Darebin. These are comprised of the Islamic Museum of Australia and the Buddhist Chua Lin Son Temple (representing our diverse community), as well as at 3 properties owned by local business Elk, an enthusiastic environmental champion.

This report recommends that Council declare a Special Charge Scheme under section 163 of the Local Government Act 1989 for the purposes of defraying expenses relating to the provision of solar energy systems on non-residential properties participating in the Solar Saver scheme.

No objections were received in response to the public notification process.

 - ii. Amount for the Special Charge to be levied be recorded as \$128,774,43, or such other amount as is lawfully levied as a consequence of this resolution.
- d) The Special Charge is declared in relation to all rateable land described in the table included as **Appendix A** to this report, in the amount specified in the table as applying to each piece of rateable land.
- e) The following list is specified as the criteria that form the basis of the Special Charge so declared:
 - Ownership of any land described in paragraph 1(d) of this resolution.
- f) The following is specified as the manner in which the Special Charge so declared will be assessed and levied:
 - i. A Special Charge calculated by reference to the size of the solar energy system being installed and the particular costs of installation at each property participating in the Solar Saver scheme, in respect of which an Agreement has been executed, totalling \$128,774,43, being the total cost of the scheme to Council
 - ii. To be levied each year for a period of 10 years.
- g) Having regard to the preceding paragraphs of this resolution and subject to section 166(1) of the Act, let it be recorded that the owners of the land described in paragraph 1(d) of this resolution will pay the Special Charge in the amount set out in paragraph 1(f) of this resolution in the following manner:
 - i. Payment annually by a lump sum on or before one month following the issue by Council of a notice levying payment under section 163(4) of the Act; or
 - ii. Payment annually by four instalments to be paid by the dates which are fixed by Council in a notice levying payment under section 163(4) of the Act.
- (2) Considers that there will be a special benefit to those required to pay the Special Charge because there will be a benefit to them that is over and above, or greater than, the benefit that is available to those who are not subject to the proposed Special Charge, as a result of the expenditure proposed by the Special Charge, in that the properties will have the benefit of a solar energy system being installed.
- (3) For the purposes of having determined the total amount of the Special Charge to be levied:
 - Considers and formally records that only those rateable properties included in the Solar Saver scheme as proposed will derive a special benefit from the imposition of the Special Charge, and there are no community benefits to be paid by Council; and
 - b) Formally determines for the purposes of section 163(2)(a), (2A) and (2B) of the Act that the estimated proportion of the total benefits of the Special Charge to which the performance of the function or the exercise of the power relates (including all special benefits and community benefits) that will accrue as special benefits to those who are liable to pay the Special Charge is 100%.

- (4) Directs that notice be given to all owners and occupiers of properties included in the Scheme in writing of the decision of Council to declare and levy the Special Charge, and the reasons for the decision. For the purposes of this paragraph, the reasons for the decision of Council to declare the Special Charge are that:
 - a) There is no objection to the Scheme and it is otherwise considered that there is a broad level of support for the Special Charge from all property owners and occupiers.
 - b) Council considers that it is acting in accordance with the functions and powers conferred on it under the *Local Government Act 1989*, having regard to its role, purposes and objectives under the Act, particularly in relation to its functions of advocating and promoting proposals which are in the best interests of the community and ensuring the peace, order and good government of Council's municipal district.
 - c) All those who are liable or required to pay the Special Charge and the properties respectively owned or occupied by them will receive a special benefit of a solar energy system being installed at the property.
- (5) Where a participant wishes to withdraw from the Scheme, agrees to such withdrawal where the participant has given written notice of their desire to withdraw from the Scheme before Council has incurred any expenditure in relation to the participant's solar system.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Local Government Act 1989 (the Act) requires the Victorian Electoral Commission (VEC) to conduct electoral representation reviews (ERR) before every third Council General Election, approximately every 12 years. The last ERR for Darebin City Council was in 2007.

Each ERR considers:

- Whether the number of Councillors is appropriate
- Whether the municipality should be unsubdivided, with Councillors elected from the whole local Council, or subdivided into wards
- If subdivided, the number of wards, ward boundaries and number of Councillors per ward.

The Darebin City Council ERR commenced in June 2019, with the opening of preliminary submissions. Council made a preliminary submission to the review in July 2019 and a response submission to the VEC's preliminary report in September 2019. The Mayor and Chief Executive Officer also spoke to Council's response submission at the public hearing on 24 September 2019.

On 16 October 2019, the VEC released its final report, which was submitted to the Minister for Local Government (Attachment A).

The report makes the following recommendations, which are consistent with Council's submissions to the review:

- Maintenance of nine Councillors overall
- Maintenance of the three multi-member ward structure
- A slight change to the boundary between Cazaly and La Trobe wards, as per Option A
 in the preliminary report, which was supported by Council.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Local Government Act 1989 (the Act) sets out the requirements for municipal general elections. The election period, or caretaker period, is the period commencing 32 days before the election. For the next election on 24 October 2020, the election period will commence on 22 September 2020.

The current Darebin City Council's Election Period Policy, which was adopted in February 2016, established a further 25-day period beyond the legislated 32-day requirement called a 'Pre-Election Period'. This policy maintains that approach.

Section 93B of the Act requires all councils to review, and if required, amend an election period policy not later than 12 months before the commencement of each election period. The policy must include:

- procedures intended to prevent the Council from making inappropriate decisions or using resources inappropriately during the election period before a general election
- limits on public consultation and the scheduling of Council events
- procedures to ensure that access to information held by Council is made equally available and accessible to candidates during the election.

Council's policy has been reviewed in line with this legislative requirement and is presented for consideration at **Appendix A**.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The purpose of this report is to seek Council's approval to award contract CT201979 – Play space upgrade at Bundoora Park and LE Cotchin Reserve to an appropriately qualified contractor.

Darebin has an ongoing commitment to continually upgrade and renew play spaces as stipulated in the Council Plan, Playspace Strategy and Capital Works Program. The Council Plan 2017-2021 commits that six play spaces will be built or upgraded each financial year.

Council continuously audits and maintains over 130 playgrounds across the municipality to ensure safety to all residents and particularly children using these facilities. This financial year under the Play Space Program, LE Cotchin Reserve (Reservoir) and Bundoora Park River Red Gum play spaces will be upgraded. The additional four play spaces to be upgraded this financial year under separate budgets and programs are: Penders Park (Thornbury), Baden Morgan Reserve (Northcote), CH Sullivan Reserve (Reservoir) and Bundoora Homestead (Bundoora).

The appointment of an experienced contractor for the installation of the playground equipment and associated landscape works was sought via a competitive open tender process. The proposed contract arrangement is a lump sum contract. Works are programmed to commence in early December and be completed by April 2020.
